EDUCATION

Grant Coordination: Grant coordination efforts allow Mifflin and Juniata Counties to be the applicants on a variety of grants designed for community development to improve services to the residents of our counties. The process typically starts with the identification of an eligible funding source by county offices or departments who then contact a variety of collaborative boards to determine interest and the county grant writer and/or the director will meet with groups to begin the grant writing process. Once the grant is obtained, the grant writer coordinates the fiscal and program reporting requirements of the grant.

MAJOR GRANT COLLABORATIONS:

- O JC VPR: Grant collaboration with JVBDS, JC School District, RedCo Group, and CCR to provide school-based mental health services in the Juniata County School District. The program was a huge success. The grant ended in 2022. However, the program has been sustained and the services continue to be offered in the schools.
- o Co-Responder: Grant collaboration with JVBDS, Lewistown Police Department, CCR and other police departments. This grant provides a mental health co-responder to police departments in Mifflin County. The program was a success and, although, the grant ended in 2022 the program has been sustained.
- o Re-Entry Coordinator: Grant collaboration with CJAB to provide SIM training and the creation of a dashboard. This grant also ended in 2022 with great success and has been sustained.
- o BJA Rural VCR: Provides funding for co responder and CIT training. CIT training was held with 15 participants. Grant is ongoing into 2024.

Housing Stability

• Homeless Assistance Program

The Homeless Assistance Program (HAP) provides services to people who are at risk of becoming homeless or who are homeless. Participants must demonstrate that with the prevention and intervention services provided by HAP they will be able to meet their basic needs in the immediate and near future. Clients must prove that their gross monthly income does not exceed 150% of the federal poverty level, the household has adequate permanent, sustainable income and demonstrate the ability to maintain rent and sustain their basic needs and that household has the funds above HAP eligibility in order to bring current balance owed to zero. Clients have a responsibility to complete all necessary documents and give total disclosure of required documents and information. Clients are required to attend three case management meetings within a 90 day period to set goals and create a spending plan for the household. HAP has a budget year of July 1 to June 30. In 2022 HAP numbers decreased due to the utilization of ERAP funds, which cover 18 months opposed to the 1 month covered under the HAP program.

PHARE

The Pennsylvania Housing Affordability and Rehabilitation Enhancement Fund (PHARE) provides rental assistance to people who are at risk of becoming homeless or who are homeless. This program is similar to the HAP program, with the exception of the case management piece. PHARE case management is a six-month period and during this time there are additional funds to assist with rent and utilities to stabilize client's financial outlook. Due to the funding time frame, the PHARE grant for 2021 is open until 2023.

SCA Housing Grant

MJHS partners with the Tri-county Drug and Alcohol Commission (SCA) to administer the State Opioid Response Support Services Navigation & Housing Services for Individuals with Opioid Use Disorder grant (SCA SOR grant). This grant allows us to utilize HS staff and SCA staff to meet the needs of substance abuse individuals in need of housing. Staff meet monthly in a team setting to discuss and refer clients to the program. The HS Housing Resource Assistant provides unit development and housing checks while the HS Housing Stability Coordinator provides case management and budget services. SCA Case managers provide DA services. The program works with approximately 10 persons a year to keep them safe and stably housed.

• Veterans Grant

The Veterans Affairs grant provides services to veterans and the local Veterans Affairs office. Direct services to veterans include rental assistance, utility assistance and heating assistance. Both Veterans Affairs Office in Mifflin and Juniata Counties receive \$40,000 to assist in Veteran outreach initiatives. This includes advertising materials, outreach space rental, and cemetery flags. This year MJHS also used grant dollars to equip the REBOOT program in Juniata County with a laptop, projector and many outreach items. Funds from 2022 were also used to host the Attorney General's Office presentation on avoiding scams targeting veterans. Funds also support events on Memorial Day and Veteran's Day.

Energy Bank

Mifflin Juniata Human Services partners with the Mifflin Juniata United Way to provide both Mifflin and Juniata County residents with heating assistance. The Energy Bank provides a one time, minimum delivery of the preferred heating source to qualified residents. To qualify for the Energy Bank clients must be denied LIHEAP. There is no income eligibility, however, a copayment based on income does apply. Clients 60 and over and veterans are eligible for the Energy Bank regardless of receipt of LIHEAP benefits and the copay is waived. Clients have a responsibility to complete all necessary documents and give total disclosure of required documents and information. During the appointment financial health, energy conservation and weatherization information is provided. The Energy Bank is funded through the Walk For Warmth, which is organized by the Mifflin Juniata United Way.

Healthy Communities

Healthy community coordination allows MJHS the opportunity to engage in a variety of programs that affect the healthy development of our community.

Food Security

• State Food Purchase Program

We partner with four food pantries in Mifflin County to provide food security through the State Food Purchase Program (SFPP). Organizations submit an application for funds. The SFPP board reviews the submitted request and designates approval and allotments for each submission. Organizations then choose whether they would like to receive food through the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank or a local vendor. This food is then combined with other donated food to provide scheduled food distributions.

Clients receive a non-perishable box, which includes items such as soups, canned vegetables, canned fruit, tomato products, canned meat, cereal, rice products, spaghetti, macaroni and cheese, instant potatoes, Jell-O, peanut butter, crackers, cake mix and paper products. This box usually weighs around 25 to 30 pounds. Clients also receive a perishable box, which includes milk, a dozen eggs, 2 kinds of meat, potatoes, apples, onions, carrots, apple juice or grape juice, bread, a bakery item, yogurt.

This year we added VFW and Mother Hubbard's Cupboard to the list of agencies who receive TEFAP food in Mifflin County. The Salvation Army also re-instated their participation with TEFAP. For the 2022/23 TEFAP year we have 4 agencies receiving food. This is an increase from 1 agency in 2021/22. This food is added as a supplement to the monthly food boxes that are distributed at Calvary Bible. For Salvation Army and Mother Hubbard's Cupboard the food is added to their grocery table for consumers to choose from as they come in for food. The VFW uses their TEFAP food to supplement the Military Share food distribution that is held once a month for active and nonactive veterans at the Lewistown Armory.

Food Calendars

Mifflin Juniata Human Services maintains a monthly food calendar. The calendar can be found on the Mifflin County website and is also distributed to 71 different people from organizations such as churches, Mifflin Juniata United Way, Geisinger, Seda-Cog, Primary Health, Mifflin Juniata Regional Services, food pantries, home health care agencies, Mifflin County School District, and low-income housing facilities. Mifflin and Juniata Food Pantries have remained strong during COVID and are back to operating as they were pre-COVID. In Mifflin County, the Salvation Army and Mother Hubbard's Cupboard are open daily by appointment and New Life Church, Hands of Grace and Calvary Bible offer a monthly food distribution. Free meals in Mifflin County are offered once a month by St. Vincent DePaul, The Lumina Center, St. Mark's Episcopal Church, St. Mark's Luthern Church, Lewistown Presbyterian, New Life Church, Freedom United Methodist Church and Kish Valley Grace Brethern. In Juniata County, the Juniata County Food Pantry is open twice a week and also provides a food distribution once a month in Turkey Valley. Journey Christian Church, Table of Grace, East Waterford Presbyterian Church, Arch Rock United Methodist and Lighthouse Community Church offers once a month food distribution with the Iskcon Farm offering a food distribution twice a month. Please refer to the food resource calendars for the dates and times of food distributions and free meals.

Food Summit

On October 17, 2022 Mifflin Juniata Human Services again partnered with Central Pennsylvania Food Bank to sponsor "A Day in the Life" food summit for the local food pantry/free meal volunteers, as well as organization involved with food insecurity. There were 35 people in attendance from 12 different organizations that provide food security in Mifflin and Juniata Counties. The event included a food insecurity simulation where participants were given a community member profile with a goal to feed that profile for a day with healthy, nutritious food on the budget they were given. The event included lunch and each participant received a gift bag that included a variety of items locally made in Mifflin and Juniata County by small businesses.

Information and Referral

o Telephone Intake

The role of the Community Resource Coordinator is to ensure that each person contacting the Mifflin Juniata Human Services office understands what resources are available for their particular needs in order to prevent issues in the future. Needs are assessed during the telephone intake process. The Healthy Communities Coordinator asks questions regarding the nature of the call, household size, income and expenses. Through these conversations information is gathered to assess eligibility for MJHS programs, along with other community resources available. Eligible programs are explained and appointments are scheduled with the case manager.

Outcome Results System (ORS) Management

The Outcome Results System (ORS) is a complete software application that provides human service organizations the ability to collect, track, analyze and report all of the data that is critical to their operations. Mifflin Juniata Human Services maintains the ORS system for our community. Many of our partnering agencies, as well as other community service agencies utilize ORS to prevent duplication of services and collect data. The Community Resource Coordinator manages the ORS system. This includes adding/deleting ORS users, updating user agreements, training new users, merging duplicate family members, and general ORS clean up. We have 14 partner agencies with 37 users on the ORS system. In November of 2022, John Hume, a representative from Design Data held a training at the Annex on the updates in the ORS system. Eight agencies sent ORS users from their agency to the training.

Community Capacity Building

The Community Resource Coordinator provides meeting minutes for the SFPP board meeting, staff meetings, housing coalition, Mifflin County Communities That Care, Juniata County Prevention Board and other meetings as needed. The Community Resource Coordinator also attends the Mifflin Juniata Human Resource Council Meetings, LINK meetings and MATP coordinating meetings.

o Human Services Website

With funding available through the Re-Entry Coordination grant the housing coalition developed a human services website. Human Services grants and programs are constantly changing.
